SCONUL Autumn conference: 18 November: 2 places left

ACS survey and consultation

The negotiations for a new deal with the American Chemical Society are ongoing with Jisc, but a combination of an article development charge and price increases are making it difficult for institutions to resubscribe. SCONUL undertook a survey with subscribing members last week, who were not in RLUK. We had a good response rate and our findings indicate a strong rejection of the deal. Technology-enhanced library spaces

SCONUL is commissioning a series of case studies exploring the development and use of technology enhanced library spaces for publication. SCONUL Community perspectives on library apprenticeships survey results

SCONUL has published the [results of its recent survey on library apprenticeships](#) in advance of the introduction of the new Level 7 Library, Information and Knowledge Manager standard in England in 2025. It shows strong support for apprenticeships and traineeships across the sector which are seen as bringing a wide range of benefits to the host library including increased diversity within the workforce; improving retention; bringing fresh thinking and new perspectives and developing the skills of current staff. The survey was carried out as part of a project which is exploring the scope for apprenticeships to support the development of a diverse, representative and committed workforce. [Read more](#)

Next generation OA: sector consultation

Jisc has launched a programme of work with the goal of resetting the UK's open access agreements – a catalyst for greater equitable participation in research and securing financial sustainability for the sector. Over the next year, the next generation OA programme will focus on adopting equitable licensing for open access agreements and supporting the sector to integrate this approach into their financial and decision-making processes and negotiating with the five largest publishers by expenditure to reduce costs. Negotiations will begin formally in 2025 and, in preparation, Jisc have launched a consultation to establish requirements for the next agreements and identify the support needed for the new strategy to succeed. Anna Vernon, Head of portfolio, content licensing at Jisc, will be presenting a Q&A session on Next generation open access at the SCONUL Autumn Conference on 18 November.

UK Print Book Collection (UKPBC) call for partners

The UK PBC is being launched as a national collection of print books. By setting a threshold of seven print copies to be retained across participating libraries the UK PBC will enable libraries to manage down their print collections whilst retaining access to print books for current and future library users. The UK PBC is supported by the British Library's UKRR Team and Jisc's Library Hub. Behind the scenes at SCONUL

The SCONUL team is working with Jisc on sector preparedness for the **next round of journal negotiations** and we look forward to discussing this with members at the November conference. Ann Rossiter has been meeting Jisc colleagues one to one and with other SCONUL representatives on the [Content Expert Group](#). Lisa McLaren has been representing SCONUL at the October meeting of the [UKRI Open Access Stakeholder Forum](#) talking about **capacity building in open access longform publications** and the bedding in of the policy in this area.

To support negotiations with content and other suppliers, SCONUL is preparing a **follow up survey on sector finances** which will be issued in November. This is an important piece of work which will inform Jisc’s negotiations on the sector’s behalf and help shape the sectors’ collective response to the financial challenges we are facing.

Thanks to colleagues who have responded to our recent surveys on the **Future of the Systems librarian** and our consultation on **a new Organisational Development Knowledge Base**. The project teams are busy analysing the results and will be sharing the responses with the community in coming weeks. We are

also underway with commissioning case studies on “[how to get ahead in libraries](#)” and on [technology enhanced library spaces](#) which will be available in spring 2025.

Over October and November our new [Community of Interest Groups](#) are meeting for the first time and we will sharing an update on this work next month. It’s not too late to sign up – please email sconul@sconul.ac.uk.
