## 'How equitable is it?' tool launched

COAlition S, Jisc and PLOS have launched the new '[How Equitable is it?' tool](#) to assess the equity of scholarly communication models. It was developed by a working group including librarians, library consortia representatives, funders and publishers, and convened by cOAlition S, Jisc and PLOS. It provides a framework for evaluating scholarly communication models and arrangements. The tool, which was inspired by the How Open Is It? framework, is aimed at institutions, library consortia, funders and publishers. It offers users the opportunity to rate scholarly communication models and arrangements across seven criteria: access to read; publishing immediate OA; maximizing participation; re-use rights; pricing and fee transparency; promoting and encouraging open research practices in relation to data and code, and to pre-prints and open peer review. The first two titles to be released from October 2024 are: *Conversations with Tim Ingold: Anthropology, education and life* By Tim Ingold, Robert Gibb, Philip Tonner and Diego Maria Malara and *Digital Editing and Publishing in the Twenty-First Century* Edited by James O'Sullivan, Michael Pidd, Michael Kurzmeier, Orla Murphy, Bridgette Wessels and Sophie Whittle. ### Launch of the new Museum Data Service

The Museum Data Service ([MDS](#)) a collaboration between Art UK, Collections Trust, and the University of Leicester has been officially launched. It has been designed to be accessible for all museums, regardless of size, allowing them to upload collections and consequently allowing users to search and access them. The service is aiming to gather item and collections data across the estimated 80 million object records spread across hundreds of UK museum databases, most of them offline. It launches having already collected an initial 3.1m records from 21 museums, with a further 1.9m records in the pipeline. [Read more](#).
