HE Reference Models webinar series

Everything you wanted to know about the HE Reference Models but were afraid to ask, 24 March 14.00 – 15.30hrs

The HE Reference Models have been increasingly appearing on libraries' radar as they are being used to support and inform change processes in HE institutions. Come along to this webinar to discover why the HE Reference Models matter; how they work; and how they are being used to meet the challenges of digital transformation and to support other change processes within your institution. We will hear from:

- Russell Boyatt, Director of Strategy and Architecture at the London School of Economics and member of the UCISA Enterprise Architecture Group who will set out the 'what, why and how' of the HE Reference Models and highlight plans for the development of a new HERMS Service Model.
- Anna O'Neill, SCONUL co-chair and University Librarian at the University of Warwick about the collaborative work that SCONUL has been doing with UCISA colleagues to ensure that library representation in the HERMs fully reflects the scope of libraries contribution to the business capabilities of the institution.

HE Reference Models as a tool for institutional transformation, 21 May 14.00 – 15.30hrs

The HE Reference Models are being used as a tool for those leading institutional restructuring and transformation programmes, often alongside, or integrated with other frameworks. This webinar will include a deeper dive into how the HE Reference Models are being used to inform institutional change processes. It will also introduce the new HE Service Reference Model which is being developed to help support this type of work. We will hear from:

- Mary Millard, Executive Director of Faculty Operations at University of Bristol and sponsor of Bristol's Professional Services Transformation Programme which has led the development of the institution's service catalogue based on the HERMs.
- Iain McCracken, Director of Service Delivery at the London School of Economics. Iain is leading the development of the new HE Service Reference Model and he will set out the background to its development; share the alpha version of the Service Model and discuss how the SCONUL community can engage with this work.

Town hall meeting on the Big Five negotiations

SCONUL and RLUK held a joint Town Hall meeting, under Chatham House Rule, on 18 February. The webinar focused on reflecting on recent negotiations with the major academic publishers and assessing what worked well and what challenges emerged. Jisc described how a small number of institutions have chosen to step away from one or more agreements, often due to cost pressures or concerns about publisher practices, and explained the support being offered to those negotiating alternative arrangements. Jisc Library portfolio and roadmap and webinar 6 May

Jisc has published its new [library portfolio roadmap](#), which sets out how Jisc intend to support the sector across discovery, access and digital capability across the research and learning life cycle. The roadmap sets out early thinking across five areas: sustainable acquisition of content and systems; national discovery infrastructure; identity and access management; community and standards; and digital transformation and capability. Jisc will be holding a webinar for Library directors and senior leaders, on 6 May, 10.00 – 11.00hrs, where they will walk through the roadmap in detail and discuss emerging needs across higher education and research. Feedback will be invited on where collective effort should focus, including where you want to invest, where gaps are emerging, and which national-level interventions will have the greatest impact. Jisc announces closure of Publication Router

Jisc has announced that it will be retiring the Publications Router service on 1 July 2026 as it judges that it is no longer operationally or financially sustainable and would require “significant reinvestment to keep secure and cannot evolve sustainably to meet future OA requirements”. It is working with affected institutions on alternative support models. [Read more](#)

Applications are now open for the LIRG Research Award 2026. The award supports high-quality research in Library, Information and Knowledge (LIK) practice, conducted by UK-based researchers. Applicants should be experienced in the field. Projects should be completed within 12 months, culminating in the acceptance of an open-access journal article. Additional dissemination activities such as blogs, infographics, short videos, or online presentations are encouraged. Applications must include a concise research proposal, budget, project plan, and details of the research team. All materials and outputs must acknowledge the “LIRG Research Award 2026”.
