### Copim and SCONUL: exploring practical problems and potential strategies to fund equitable OA book publishing, 25 January 2024, 10.00hrs

SCONUL and Copim Open Book Futures are holding a webinar to explore the difficulties of funding open access books, and how different libraries have developed strategies to tackle these challenges. There is a growing shift towards open access (OA) for books, with policies such as UKRI mandating OA publication and a number of OA presses springing up at different universities. But when some institutions are not eligible for funding, and budgets are under increasing pressure, can libraries support this shift to open access for books? If so, how might it be done? This webinar, chaired by Andrew Barker, will hear from Phil Brabban, University Librarian and Group Director of Learning Resources at Coventry University, Dominic Broadhurst, Head of Content & Discovery at University of Salford and Anna Clements - Director of Library Services and University Librarian at University of Sheffield. ### SCONUL Content Forum: The future of subscriptions, 2 February 2024

The results of the Critical Review of Transitional Agreements will be published in January, and SCONUL is bringing the sector together to discuss its findings and to consider the future approach to subscriptions at the next meeting of the SCONUL Content Forum. This is a face-to-face meeting which will be held at Goodenough College, London, on Friday 2 February 2024, 10.00am to 4.00pm. There is no charge for attending. The first UK transitional agreement was agreed on behalf of the UK library community in 2016. Since then, 47 such agreements have been reached, including with Elsevier in 2022 and Springer Nature earlier this year. Despite the work and commitment that has gone into developing these agreements, progress towards open access has been slow, while costs remain very high. The time has come to consider the set of options open to the sector on subscriptions which will shape our work and inform Jisc's approach to negotiations. The Forum is open to heads of service and their senior leadership teams from member institutions only and meets once a year, or more often if required. ### Coalition of HE sector bodies to tackle the lack of ethnic diversity at leadership level

Over the last 12 months, a group of representatives from a wide range of HE sector bodies have come together to pool resources and knowledge to tackle the lack of ethnic diversity in the leadership of academic/education and student professional services. In November 2022, research was carried out to understand the level of challenge faced as a sector. The results of the data showed good representation of ethnically diverse staff at entry levels into academic and student services. This was reduced by c.50% at each salary step until reaching virtually no representation in director-level roles. It also identified a severe and worrying data gap with many directors not having access to the data about their staff. This is a sector-wide issue that can't be tackled in isolation and representatives from AHEP, AMOSSHE, The Student Services Organisation, HESPA, the HE Strategic Planners Association, the Association of Heads of University Administration (AHUA), AGCAS, the Academic Registrars Council, SCONUL, UHR: Universities Human Resources and Shakespeare Martineau have come together to form the #HigherDiversityCoalition. ### UKRI update on new open access policy and fund for monographs, book chapters and edited collections

UKRI will be implementing their open access policy requirements for monographs, book chapters, and edited collections published from 1 January 2024. Ahead of this date they have announced some key information:

- 1. There will be a nine-month bedding in period for the policy, meaning between January and September, UKRI will not be monitoring compliance or taking any action. Any contracts negotiated from January 2024 should support open access publication.
- 2. The fund to support open access longform publications will operate in two stages. Stage 1 is now open for applications from research organisations via Citizen Space and further details can be found at: <a href="https://www.ukri.org/manage-your-award/publishing-your-research-findings/open-access-funding-your-award/publishing-your-research-findings/open-access-funding-your-award/publishing-yo

<u>and-reporting/</u>. Stage 2 applications will open in January 2024 via UKRI's funding service. Your institution can provide more detail on what this will look like.

There are maximum levels of funding from UKRI for each type of publication:

- £10,000 (including VAT) for entire monographs and edited collections
- £1,000 (including VAT) for book chapters
- £6,000 for non-book processing charge models where one eligible UKRI output is published (i.e. diamond, collective or subscribe to open models).
- An additional £3,000 is also available where two or more UKRI publications from the same institution are published under the same model.
- VAT is not charged in the UK for these models, but where VAT is chargeable, this is included in the maximum funding level.

### GW4 Alliance launches joint statement on rights retention in scholarly works

Library teams from across the GW4 Alliance, a consortium of four of the most research-intensive and innovative universities in the UK: Bath, Bristol, Cardiff and Exeter, have joined together to publish a collective Rights Retention Statement, advocating for greater measures to support researchers to retain the rights to their work. ### The British Library: technology outage, 31 October 2023

The British Library is continuing to experience a major technology outage, as a result of a cyber-attack. The outage is affecting its website, online systems and services, as well as some onsite services including their Reading Rooms and public wifi. They anticipate restoring many services in the next few weeks, but some disruption may persist for longer. The British Library have now confirmed that this was a ransomware attack, by a group known for such criminal activity. In response to the attack, targeted protective measures have been taken to ensure the integrity of its systems, including a full password reset and the quarantining of hardware to enable the installation of additional monitoring and detection software across the estate. These and other measures will enable the British Library to restore their systems in a safe and managed way, and further updates will be provided in the coming weeks.
